For **Sowmya Vijaydev**, Senior Manager - Business Transformation Office (BTO) Core Services, a career in cybersecurity was a natural fit.

“I’ve always been fascinated by how technology can transform businesses, and shape the future,” said Sowmya, who first worked in sales and operations for several technology companies. “As I advanced in my career, I saw the critical role cybersecurity plays in protecting our data and systems. I wanted to be part of a company that had a global impact on safety and security. Cybersecurity’s ever-evolving nature creates challenges and opportunities that I find incredibly motivating.”

Sowmya joined CyberArk in June 2023, supporting Revenue Operations, Go to Market (GTM) Operations, GTM Enablement, Proposal and Bid Management, Renewal Support, Services Operations, Business Intelligence, and Global Training and Education Services. ### **Keep Learning – and Ask for Advice**

“One thing I’ve learned from one of my own mentors is the importance of asking for advice,” reflected Sowmya. “I still consult him for advice and apply other’s feedback to help me create even better ideas.”

“I think women can be discouraged from pursuing a career in cybersecurity, as it has a reputation for being a male-dominated industry,” continued Sowmya. “When I first began my career, I struggled to assert myself in a predominately male workplace. To keep growing and build my confidence, I actively sought women mentors in my field; I encourage any women working in cybersecurity to do the same. Join a networking group, reach out to someone on LinkedIn – your perfect mentor is out there.”

“My final piece of advice,” said Sowmya, “is to always pursue learning. Make time to focus on your development and find ways to step out of your comfort zone. Growth happens when you challenge yourself. Stretch yourself: raise your hand to lead a project, learn a new skill, speak up in a meeting – it helps you grow. Not all things may be smooth at first, but each new challenge or risk brings you closer to success.”
